I intend also to take the post-graduate year in law, as I think it quite essential.

Will be promoted on the first of July from \$900 to either \$1,000 or \$1,200, I haven't learned which yet.

to participate in the exercises
on that occasion; and am
glad to learn that the work
of "reconstruction" is going on
so well.

I met the
party of excursionists under
the guidance of Prof. Hough-
ton, and in conversation with
Mr. Allen Philpott he said
that there was no doubt but
that Indiana University had
a great future before it.

My brother Ford is doing
well. He has been in constant
