To the Pres of the University of Indiana.

Dear Sir

I have recently returned from Europe where I have been teaching and studying and am desirous of securing a professorship in one of our neighboring Universities for the coming year. My friends in Indiana and Wisconsin advise me to make application to you for a position in your corps of instructors.

Educated at the University of Michigan and at the Sorbonne at Paris, I have taught seven years, five of which I was at the head of the Classical Dept. of the Milwaukee High School. I have made a specialty of Greek, Latin, Greek and Roman antiquities, art, English and French literatures. My translations of "Demosthenes" and "Political Eloquence in Greece" are, as you will learn from the enclosed credentials, very favorably received in both England and America. As soon as received I

will take the liberty to present you with copies of these works. High schools and academies are open to me in this state and in others but I feel that my experience and education entitle me to a position where I can teach advanced students. In case you should deem me worthy of a position in your Faculty, I would be disappointed if I did not draw several students from Wisconsin and Illinois to the University of Indiana.

In consideration of these facts and at the suggestion of a prominent Chicago educator I venture to send you the enclosed credentials which will, in a measure, indicate how well I have filled the positions thus far assigned to me. I am at present preparing the Life of Gambetta for publication a copy of which I will send you when out.

Trusting that you will find time to examine the credentials and return the same to me, and that, when changes occur in your Faculty, you may favorably consider my application. I am most respectfully yours
