My dear Doctor:

Your letter seems to require a speedy answer, so I will write you a conclusion that may be a little hasty.

I am ask if the change you suggest would be "just as satisfactory & convenient to me." I cannot make myself feel that it would be. I have ordered, at my own expense, some ^{three} hundred dollars worth of books relating to the Constitution and History of the U. S., & these books are to be for the use of all our students, but especially for such as

shall desire to do special work on the subject to which they relate. Carrying out your suggestion would be in the way of my doing, with much success, this election work, which I have proposed to do & ^{for} which there seemed last spring, to be an earnest wish.

a personal favor. One

have work with the Prisons,
may be able to accom-
modate you. I hope
they will.
