Sir

If you should need an opinion on the defence of Bloomington University buildings from lightning, I should be glad to assist you.

Last year I wrote a small work on The Action of Lightning (Lockwood & Co. - London) mentioned in Van Nostrand's Circular of July

1882, advocating certain simple economical measures of defense leading to prevent lightning strokes and not involving the use of lightning rods or, necessarily, of any apparatus.

I have devoted much time to the study of lightning and have amass'd nearly 700 detailed instances of lightning accidents, including 123 cases of the failure of lightning rods. I consider these instruments as costly contrivances

for inviting danger to buildings.

Last month I was employed by H.M. Prison Commissioners in reporting on the recent accident at Leed Prison and in advising on its future defence.

My fee for a written opinion (plus after an examination of plans and particulars) is one guinea.

I am at present in communication with Messrs Scheide, of Oil City, Pennsylvania, in reference to the

defence of the tanks in their
charge.

If a tracing of the University
buildings accompanied by explanation
relative to site, soil, positions of
necessary metals, &c. were sent to me
I would by the return mail, or
certainly in a week's time, send
back an opinion.

I advise no patented system.
