REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF

"Preparation."

November 5. 1884.

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY:

Dear Sir:

The Principal of the Preparatory Department submits to you for transmission to the Board of Trustees the following report upon the condition &c. of the department:

1. Attendance, etc.

1. Total enrollment of pupils in Dept up to date, - - - - -	111.
1. Actual residents of city of Bloomington, - - - - -	52.
2. Non-residents + those whose parents have come for educational purposes, 59.

2. The regular session of each day opens with devotional exercises conducted mainly by the pupils at 8 A.M. + closes at 12 M. When necessary, class work is done during the afternoon; also considerable time is then spent in the drilling of pupils for rhetorical exercises held every Friday afternoon.

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Of the foregoing pupils, 24 are in regular preparation for the Freshman class at the end of the current year; 7, who are now irregular, expect to make themselves regular in the course of the year. 13 are spending three years in preparing themselves for admission to the university. In the First-Year class, there are 40 regular students + 5 irregular ones.

4. Instruction is given as follows: The Principal gives instruction in Algebra, Beginning Latin + Physiology; the first assistant Prof. Jas. A. Woodburn, in Caesar, Latin Composition, U. S. History + Zoölogy; the second assistant Prof. W<sup>m</sup>. J. Bryan, in Caesar, General History, Beginning Latin, Physical Geography + Algebra. All of the instructors assist in preparing pupils for exercises in public speaking on Friday afternoons. It affords pleasure to state that both assistants are rendering faithful, efficient, + satisfactory service. No instructor has been absent, + the duties of each have been discharged regularly up to date.

5. The discipline of the school is excellent. The bearing + general deportment of pupils are commendable. The aimus of the school in

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the preparation of daily work, in coöperation with instructors, & in general harmony & good feeling is certainly praiseworthy. In securing these results, the Principal is glad to acknowledge the cheerful coöperation & hearty sympathy of his assistants & of Miss M. H. McCalla, the superintendent of the city schools.

6. The course of instruction is in an unsettled condition on the part of the University. It is therefore respectfully urged that steps be taken at once to determine a course of Preparatory study. In the hope that this may be done, the following Preparatory curriculum drawn up recently by the writer at the suggestion of the President is presented:

Notes - 1. In Latin, this course requires the practical completion of Harkness's Latin Reader, the entire first four books of Caesar, + the entire first four books of Virgil's Aenead; also thorough drill in Latin Grammar, Latin Composition, Reading + Writing at sight + Latin Prosody. Mythology must be pursued in connection with Virgil.

2. In Mathematics, - 1<sup>st</sup> A practical application of Arithmetic to business transactions of various kinds so as, if possible, to make the pupil a ready + accurate accountant;

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1<sup>st</sup> A practical & competent knowledge of Book-keeping; 2<sup>nd</sup> Such a knowledge of Algebra as can be obtained from a thorough completion of Thomson's New Practical or Wentworth's Elements; 4<sup>th</sup> The completion of first three books of Wentworth's Plane Geometry.

3. In History. - 1<sup>st</sup> A comprehensive study of our own country's history; 2<sup>nd</sup> A knowledge of her government, leading provisions of her constitution, & some idea of the governments of other countries; 3<sup>rd</sup> As broad & full a study of General History as time & capacity of pupils will permit.

4. In English. - 1<sup>st</sup> A practical knowledge of principles & usages of English Grammar as obtained from the English sentence; 2<sup>nd</sup> The study of models of composition; 3<sup>rd</sup> Actual practice in composition; 4<sup>th</sup> A knowledge & application of principles of Rhetoric; 5<sup>th</sup> The study of models of speaking; 6<sup>th</sup> Actual practice in speaking.

5. In Science. - 1<sup>st</sup> A comprehensive study of Human & Comparative Physiology; 2<sup>nd</sup> The study of Physical Geography; 3<sup>rd</sup> An experimental knowledge (if possible) of Elementary Physics. If some knowledge of other sciences shall be deemed necessary, an outlines study of them could be obtained from a series of weekly or bi-weekly recitations, using Science primers & omitting the study of English on such day or days in each week.

6. The Friday Afternoons of each week must be devoted to Rhetorical exercises; such

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as, declamations, debates, essays, select readings, varieties & other devices for training pupils in public speaking, arising from the ingenuity of instructors.

7. Hints + talks from time to time should be given on Morals, Manners, and other matters of general culture.

Hoping the foregoing may assist somewhat in fixing a course of study for the department, the writer would respectfully suggest a conference of the Preparatory Committee of the University Board with the members of the Public-school Board of the city of Bloomington. Should further explanation upon any point in the course here offered, be found necessary one or more Preparatory instructors could be present at this conference.

The President, the members of the Board of Trustees, & especially the Preparatory Committee are cordially requested to visit the department at their convenience.
