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Florence, Alabama,

My Dear Dr. Moss:—

Not having seen you to talk with you while you were in Bloomington, I wish to express my great satisfaction and thanks for your kind reply to my letter some time since. I had settled down to the study of mathematics, when the opportunity came for this collecting tour in this region.

We stopped at Cave City, getting some blind fish from Mammoth Cave, Nashville, Franklin, Columbia, and Pulaski, the last four being County Seats in Tenn. I was

much pleased with Southern Tenn,  
it being much more prosperous  
than I had supposed. Northern  
Alabama is partially swampy,  
and rendered very poor by the  
production of cotton.

We have been quite successful  
in our fishing, getting several  
very interesting species.

Florence seems to be a fairly  
healthful place, though situated  
on the Tennessee River. The people  
here are entirely Confederate in  
feeling, but say they are more  
warmly disposed to Indiana than  
any other Northern State. This  
is probably due to their commu-  
nication by water with Indiana.  
Their products go by steamer  
to Louisville or Cincinnati &  
excursions not unfrequently

go from here to Evansville &  
vice versa..

We shall endeavor to make  
a thorough search for fishes  
here during this week, then go to  
Muntsville, Ala. for a few days,

I have a cousin and a young  
friend near Pendleton, both of whom  
expect to enter the Freshman  
Class this year. I am sure they  
will both make strong students.
