

To the Honorable Board of Trustees
Of Indiana University.
Gentlemen:

I submit the following as my semiannual report to you.

I have at present the following four classes in Greek, each meeting five hours per week.

1. A Senior class of eight members who are reading Plato. They have ^{already} this term read the Apology and the Crito, and are now reading the Gorgias, which I expect them to complete by the end of this term. They have, for the most part, already decided upon subjects for their graduating theses, and all are expected to have this work well under way by the end of the present term. They are all strong students, and none of them are behind with their work; so that I may safely say that the department of Greek will have eight graduates next June, four gentlemen and four ladies.
2. The Junior class consists of seven,

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four ladies and three gentlemen. They have been reading selections from the Lyric Poets and taking lectures on the history of lyric poetry among the Greeks. The remainder of the year will be devoted to the study of the Drama as indicated per catalogue.

3. The Sophomore class, owing to the fact that most of those who began Greek last year are now out of college, has but three members. They are reading in the third book of Xenophon's Anabasis, and have just completed Jones' Composition.

4. There are thirteen students in the beginning class, most of them students of great promise.

Besides the above classes, I am conducting a club in Homer on Tuesday evenings, and a class in New Testament Greek on Sunday afternoons.
