Dear Sir:

In connection with the work of the Department, I have to report only faithfulness, with a good degree of success on the part of the students. In the Senior class 7 are in the department of Political Science; in the Junior class, 9; in the Sophomore 14, while two or three Freshmen who have been taking the work throughout the year, signify their intention of continuing this subject as their specialty.

Besides my work at the University, I have done what I could during the last two terms to further the interests of the University elsewhere, in the following cases. ^{This may have been in that all term.}
Our lecture at Peru, Ind., - absent from classes one day; Twelve lectures in Indianapolis, in University Extension work. Some of these lectures were held during the winter term, when the classes were so arranged that no time was taken from the classes. One of the lectures, held this term, took

me away from one oration; Our lectures
in Indianapolis before the Young People's Historical
Ass'n. I was absent one day this time.;
About the middle of May, I was absent from
one oration Wednesday, all of Thursday, Friday,
and the following Monday and Tuesday. At this time
I gave a lecture at Elgin, Ill., before the Northern
Ill. Principals Ass'n, and spent three days at
the meeting of the National Conference of Charities
and Correction. My classes were excused, though
extra lessons were assigned, and students in
my department were advised to attend the
Conference, as the last meeting of the kind in the U.S.
A number attended two or three days.

June 2, I lectured at Salem, Ind. at the High
School Commencement. Missed two orations at
the time. I recall no other work done elsewhere, except
^{the lectures in Bloomington.}
During the winter term, I was confined to my
house for a week with a sprained ankle. At
this time, part of my classes came to my house to write,
others were heard by Prof. Woodburn or Mr. Fetter and
some were excused. I remain
