Gentlemen,

I hereby submit my report of the
Condition and work of the Department
of Latin.

The Freshman Class

is divided into four sections, three regular and one irregular. Of the three regular sections, one recites to me daily

Its enrollment is twenty four (24).

The other two regular sections recite to Prof. Philpott. The enrollment of the one is twenty six (26), that of the other seventeen (17). Both of his sections come to me one day in the week. Prof. Philpott has also an irregular or Sub-Freshman Class bringing up preparatory work. This class numbers thirty one (31).

The Sophomore Class

has ten members. It is reading Horace
studying Prosody and practising metrical
reading. It recites to me four days in the
week, to Prof. Philpott one day.

The Juniors and Seniors
make up a class of five (5). There are two (2)
Seniors and three (3) Juniors. They are

reading Roman Law as found in the
Institutes of Justinian.

Our total enrollment
therefore, in the department of Latin
is as follows: Regular Freshmen sixty
five (65), Irregular Freshmen thirty one (31),
making a total of ninety six Freshmen;
Sophomores ten (10), Juniors three (3), Seniors
two (2), making a total of one hun-
dred and eleven (111) in all, enrolled in
the department of Latin.

I regret to learn of the intention
of Prof Philputt to retire from the University
and seek another field of labor,
at the end of the present Calendar year.

He has been a very satisfactory
assistant and associate in the work
of instruction. Another man will
be needed to take his place. The
President has the names of several persons
who have been favorably recommended.
If no one of these is available or satis-
factory, we can certainly find a suitable
man among our alumni.
