The views of one man - in reference to  
a change in position - before I wrote  
you - and this I have only a few days  
ago had an opportunity of doing -  
I think I know about what you  
want - and I have his own in

my mind as likely to satisfy your demands - at least in some degree

I would mention first - Dr C. Leo Mees - now professor of Physics and Chemistry in the old Ohio University at Athens, Ohio.

Dr Mees is an old pupil of mine and I know him thoroughly & I do not know his age exactly but think him to be 30-40 years old. He began work as assistant to Dr Womely (now of the University of Penn) - on the Ohio Geological Survey - as Chemist. For several years he taught Physics in the "Male High School" at Louisville Ky - in which the course was quite advanced for such a school - and where he had remarkable success. I know that he has several times

been until back there at \$2000. \$2000  
per year. He left there to go to Europe for  
a couple of years - studying in Germany - and  
also in London. Before his return he was  
elected to his present position - which he  
took at a lower salary rather than to go  
back to Justice School work. In the  
language of the President - "he has revolutionized  
the work in the College". - He was my  
choice of all the Candidates - to fit the  
Chair which I left in Columbus - and  
would have been elected - (I ought to say  
that he was not a candidate for the place  
- but his name was discussed by the Board  
and myself) - had it not been for a  
peculiar condition of things - in connection  
with certain other members - of the faculty -

which in no way involved him or his fitness for the place - but which  
made it seem wise to elect some one else. His name was never,  
therefore, brought before the Board <sup>"officially"</sup>. When Dr. Angell of the  
Michigan University consulted me in regard to filling the chair of  
Physics - recalled by Professor Ward - last summer I recommended Dr. Mees,  
& do not know whether anybody has been elected him or not. Mees is  
an excellent teacher, a very good public lecturer; he speaks German  
perfectly - it being the native tongue of his father - and knows French very well  
- which I think is his mother's language. His father is the Pastor of the largest  
Lutheran Church at Columbus. He (Dr. Mees) - is also an accomplished musician.  
I can recommend him very highly - and if you desire to consider him I can  
give you further information and references. - The second man, is Park Morris  
- now a Capt in the Signal Corps - he is a younger man, has been at Johns-  
Hopkins University for several years - and will take his Doctor's degree in Physics  
next June. He has had some experience in teaching but not much & think he is  
an exceedingly bright and promising physicist = being, doubtless, better up in the mathematical  
treatment of the sciences than Mees. - I shall be glad to give you further information concerning
