

Report of the Professor of Zoology 1889

To the Honorable Board of Trustees: -

Gentlemen: -

As Professor of Zoology, I permit me to offer the following report: -

My duties as President have much interfered with the personal attention which I should give to my classes, I have therefore found it necessary to call in the assistance of a graduate student, Mr. Carl H. Eigenmann, who has conducted ^{nearly} all the routine work of the Department.

The following classes have been taught by me, with his assistance,

General Zoology - Sophomores	18 members
Advanced Botany Seniors	3 "
Ornithology. Sophomores	5 "
Original research (fishes) Seniors	5 "
Norwegian (once weekly) Seniors	3 "

The Zoological Laboratory is open the whole day, and it is necessary that some responsible person should be present at all times.

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The Zoological Museum has received numerous donations lately, the most important being from the University of Palermo, Sicily, and from the Museum of the Jardin des Plantes, at Paris.

It is probable that the sum of \$400. will cover all needful expenses of the Zoological Museum, for the year, exclusive of the pay of the assistant,

I may say that with my present work, I can accomplish in the course of the year, about one-third as much scientific work as I formerly did.

I regard this kind of work as essential to my own development, as well as important in building up the reputation of the University.

I feel it therefore to be a duty not to let this small amount of original work be curtailed, as the size of the College, and the responsibilities of my position increase.
