You can also get from Prof. Boone for your expe perience as a Supt.&c two or three credits in Pedagogy. Your outside as you have represented it, in science and any other sebjects, and also your experience as a teacher would bring three or four more. That would leave you in the neighborhood of twelve credits to complete our
