To The President
of Indiana University:

Dear Sir,

The following is respectfully submitted to you for transmission to the Board of Trustees.

In the capacity of Associate Professor in the Department of Latin I have given instruction during the year now closing to about 80 students. These have done work as follows:

1. Freshman work. - (1) Vergil - two terms - 13; (2) Cicero - two terms - 21; (3) Livy with Roman Antiquities - one term - 14.

2. Conditioned Freshman work. - (1) Inductive Latin - one term - 39; (2) Caesar's Commentaries on the Gallic War - one term - 3%; (3) Cicero's Orations - one term - 38.

In addition to regularly pursuing text of various authors, considerable work has been done in the way of Mythology & kindred work as well as thorough work in turning English into Latin, thus securing a practical working knowledge of Latin Grammar as well as style of expression peculiar to the language. I have taught 20 hours per week throughout entire year.

I may fairly say that the work has, in general, been well & faithfully done. Students have been earnest, attentive, & diligent. The spirit of the instruction has been to be thorough & scholarly & as far as possible secure the intellectual growth & discipline, to the promotion of which study of the classics has always been considered well adapted.

I have been absent during the year from 14 occasions, as follows: Four, on May 8th on invitation to deliver class address before the High School graduating class at Charlestown; Two, by virtue of attendance upon Philosophical Association at Indianapolis; Eight occasioned by the sickness & death of our baby, May 21 & 22.
