Report of the Director of the Women's
Gymnasium, to
The President and Board of Trustees of
Indiana University.

The work in this gymnasium has been fairly prosperous this year. Regular gymnasium work has been conducted for beginners, and there has also been systematic additional work for those who were in the regular class last year. Besides this, there has been at a different time a special class in theory and practice for those students who wished to fit themselves to teach physical training in the public schools.

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Sixty-eight students have been in attendance upon the gymnasium as members of one or more classes during the year. Of this number eleven were members of the teachers' class. Four of these already have secured positions to teach next year where they will teach physical training. In every case, they get larger salaries than they otherwise would because they can teach physical training, the salary in one instance being doubled thereby. As further proof of the practical value of this work to the young ladies from a merely financial point of view, I will add that I have thus far

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band of six of my former pupils
in this University who are now teaching
physical training. Evidently, even from this
point of view, it will be for the interest of
the University to keep up and improve
this work.

But results of this kind are of really
small value compared with the great
improvement in physical strength and
health, and the increased power to study,
which the work has brought to a majority
of those attending the classes.
