

Wauwaukon. Jan^y 3^d 1829

Dear Sir

Your letter enclosing the 75 dollars spoken of in your last, was handed to me, in due time, by A. C. Wilson Student: & if I am not much deceived, I did, shortly after, acknowledge the receipt of the letter by a communication sent you by private conveyance.

This has been all along my impression but I am not quite certain. If I did not, all I can say, by way of apology, is, that I intended to do it, & thought I had done it. This apology tho' not sufficient of itself, I hope you will consider so; when taken in connexion with the cares of a family & those incident to my other pursuits. I left your note to Mr Wherry, & the remainder (\$15) I took the liberty to set to your credit in acct with myself, as I was then urged by pressing demands, which, otherwise, I could not meet. In your penultimate

letter you request the state of account with
myself. It is as follows

Changes & of course news here have been
so plenty that won't give you a detail I
would not know where to begin. This is a sum-
mary. Mr Brown, at present, is at Cannonsburg
as Principal of Jefferson College, ~~& here~~ (having
been elected to that office last fall) & here as
Pastor of the congregation. But the congregation
will throw him off & take Mr Germanges, next
spring. Our number of students at present is
67. at Cannonsburg they say there is upwards of
90. A variety of untoward circumstances have
produced this effect, I mean the disproportionality
of numbers in their favour: the most effi-
cient of which I take to be less

It is impossible to discern what will come to pass. The present is not a state of perfect order. Ravery is often successful. Our business is to do right & trust God for the consequences. If he sends disappointment instead of success it is a consolation to know that our intentions have been good. — A great point will be gained to the interest of this college by the removal of W. Brown, but to what issue things may be conducted, it is impossible to conjecture.
