

Washington June 26<sup>th</sup> 1823

Dr Sir

Your favour of the 12<sup>th</sup> was received yesterday; & as the young men of whom you write will be in suspension till an answer is received, I write without delay. They can be received into the class which will graduate in the fall of 1824, & if qualified, there is no law of college to prevent their receiving a Diploma, on an equal footing with those who have gone thro' the whole course of study at this institution. The best boarding can be had, by paying some money in advance, at the rate of one dollar & twenty five cents per week. Tuition is at the rate of twenty dollars per year - washing is done at six dollars per year - coal

costs  $4\frac{1}{2}$  cents per bushel - Other expenses  
in proportion.

An assistant, (Mr. Scott son of Rev. Geo Scott)  
has been appointed in the department of  
Mathematics, Mr. Reed having progressed  
so far in habits of intemperance as to be-  
come a serious injury to the interests of the  
institution. He will be entirely removed  
shortly by the Trustees, a special meeting  
of whom has been called for that  
purpose. His place will be supplied  
by Scott & Markmen, probably.

The young men, of whose you write,  
can obtain boarding in the same house to-  
gether, on the terms above mentioned.

Had I time & spare space on this  
sheet, I would give you a pack of news  
respecting matters & things: suffice it however  
to say that Miss Mary Wherry is married  
& what is equally unexpected, Dr. McMillan

has become quite disappointed with his quondam  
friend W Brown; though he says little  
about it.

Jefferson college still is before us in  
point of numbers; & you will see that  
by the Gen. Aperry's Narrative, that it is  
noticed, together with the Allegheny College,  
as being represented in a flourish-  
ing condition!
