

It is certain that instrumental music has nothing wrong in it, of itself as it was used in the worship of God, under the old testament dispensation, but whether it be suitable for Christian worship, or whether it was used in early times either by the apostles or their immediate successors, is a question which admits of some debate. For what purpose was ~~an~~ music made a part of divine worship? and in what manner it was carried on? are important questions, which if a certain definite answer could be given, might be of some use to guide us in the investigation of this subject;

In the ^RCatholic and Episcopal Churches, particularly the former, scientific music and instrumental have been cultivated to a great extent, and we all will be inclined to conclude that their fruits have not been more abundant than those of the plain Presbyterians who use no other instrument than their voice. To the regularly trained choir there are some objections, they are generally composed of the youth of the congregation, who seated together are very apt to have their attention drawn away from the services ~~going on~~, of ~~the~~ church, their whole aim is to sing correctly and for this purpose regard for music the notes of the music books than the words of the Psalm which they are singing and then again, they can hardly fail of being enamored of the science wh. they cultivate, and ~~since~~ then of course they must display this to the congregation in singing something in itself perhaps but poor melody but pleasing to them on account of its difficulty as it is displeasing to the congregation who must sit with their mouths closed, and not able to join in the worship. and then again to the single precentor who by himself ~~you~~ leads the music of the congregation, if the congregation is large, & if the mass of the people are ~~not~~ ~~familiar~~ good correct singers, his part is too hard & oppressive. his single voice is not sufficient to give tone to the congregation, if he attempts to keep good time there are many who are opposing. every one wishes to lead and for that purpose they exalt their voices to such a pitch, that all music is lost in the noise. Here we have objections to all kinds of sacred music, ^{in use} instrumental choral and precentoral; and in truth it is not so easy to suggest a better plan. it appears to me that in ancient times the songs and psalms resembled very much the songs of the present day ~~differing in as much as they were suggested by some circumstances ~~and~~ ~~found~~ ~~in~~ ~~them~~ ~~to~~ ~~God~~ ~~either~~ ~~for~~ ~~impressing~~ ~~the~~ ~~mind~~ ~~either~~ ~~with~~ ~~the~~ ~~joy~~ ~~or~~ ~~grief~~ ~~always~~ ~~of~~ ~~you~~ differing in this respect that the former were inspired, and of ^{always} you~~
