In Memoriam.

Death of
David D.
Banta

Whereas the trustees of Indiana University have learned with sincere regret of the death of David D. Banta, for the last seven years Dean of the Law Department, and for the preceding twelve years a member and president of this board of trustees, and desiring to give expression to their appreciation of the high character and worth of the deceased, therefore, they unanimously accept the following resolution:

Resolutions

Resolved: That in the death of David D. Banta this institution has lost a most devoted friend, one always wise in its counsels, and active in promoting its best interests. Fearless in the discharge of every duty, his judgment was never swayed by personal considerations, justice and truth alone being the guides to his action, and from these he never departed. To him is mainly due the establishment and success of the Law Department, and the general prosperity of the University is largely the result of his persistent efforts in its behalf. His work in this respect will ever remain a monument to his memory.

Resolved: That this action of the trustees be spread upon the records of the University and a copy be furnished by the secretary to the family of the deceased.
