 the Athenian Society, who had held a meeting in the Soc. Hall on last Friday
 evening. — Messrs. Guier, Rops, Crabb & Davis appeared before

the faculty. W. Davis stated that he considered the cause of the
 adjournment of the Society until the last Friday of next term to arise from the
 unwillingness of ^{the leading} members to submit to the laws of the Board of Trustees.
