Charge: Conduct unbecoming a student & a gentleman
Specification 1st. In this that on or about the day of Jan. 1864, W. Ley den in company with W. Ward took some young women to a saloon where intoxicating drinks were indulged in & the resulting noise attracted a considerable crowd, causing scandal & discredit to the Dist. University.

Specification 2^d. In this that on or about the day of Jan. 1864 W. Ley den opposed himself to permitting said young women to be taken to their home, where they had been exposing themselves in a disgraceful manner, that he entered into an unbecoming altercation with W. Williams, who had been engaged by their father to take them home, causing by such quarrel & profane language in the public street, scandal & discredit to the Dist. University.

W. Ley den introduced his witness, W. Ward who testified that W. L. was not in the picture gallery before nor after the difficulty, met W. L. first at the meat-shop & did not see him in the colored saloon; does not think he was in it. Williams commenced on them first. W. Aid & a number of others were standing round, anxious to see how

James H. Foster being duly sworn upon his oath states that at said Co. on 19 Feb. 1864 Abram Wagner, John Carney, Herschel Peters, Joseph Mear, Hmery Grabb, W. Owen, John Davis, Amos Rop. & Omer Wolf did an act in a violent ^{unlawful} manner, by them & others in the manner aforesaid combining unlawfully together & being so combined together, then & there did in the manner aforesaid, unlawfully break into & enter the Hall in the State University Buildings of the Lith. Library Soc. & did then & there ^{in the manner aforesaid} use violence & destroy the property of said society, as affiant truly believes, contrary to the form of the Statute in such case made & provided.

Mr. Ward's evidence the girls behaved, they being intoxicated. — Mr. Ward's evidence being closed the case ~~for~~ deferred until Monday for further testimony.

11. March 1864 Faculty met, all the members present. Prayer by Prof. Wyllie. Mr. Carson & Mr. Cyrus Butt were called in, charged with talking at prayers.

Mr. Carson Mr. Carson thought he had not talked loud and will try to avoid it in future.

Mr. Butt Mr. Butt acknowledged he had spoken, but only in answer to a question asked. Will avoid doing so in future.

The President announced that all the Students had now agreed to submit to the ordinances of the Board, except Honorable Dismissal. Mr. Shumway, who withdrew from the Society. He and Mr. Hull applied for honorable dismissals, which were granted.

Mr. Leyden's case dismissed. On further investigation of Mr. Leyden's case, it was resolved that the 1st specification (the 1st part of the 2^d were
