Roll Call found Benzel and Van Horne ^{absent.} ~~B~~
 Mr. Tuttle reported that in the three-day canvass for memberships, that 455 had been secured. After a discussion on house canvassing, the board, by consent, voted that each board member should be responsible for his own house, and houses not represented by the board would be visited by men selected by Mr. Rector.

It was decided to fix a price of \$1.⁰⁰ for union members and \$¹.⁵⁰ for all others at the dance Friday night if it was held down town. Mr. Cooper that the band and chaperons had been secured.

The treasurer reported that the Union had a balance of \$623.³³ in the bank, which, with membership fees would make a balance of more than \$1,000.

The treasurer also reported that at the beginning of the summer, Frank Potter was given \$2,300 and after this sum was exhausted, Potter took his salary from income from pool tickets. After miscellaneous expenses were taken care of, the treasurer received \$35.²⁵, the pool room running at a loss for the summer of \$30 plus expenses.

Mr. Cooper explained that Pres. Bryan had expressed a desire to have some location for the Memorial Drive regiment headquarters and the board discussed the feasibility of turning over the Red Room or $\frac{1}{2}$ of reading room. No decision needed or lounge room.

The discussion in regard to new pool equipment met with no action.

Mr. Ringer suggested that the secretary look into the constitution of the board and to report at the next meeting on absences.

The board ~~then~~ discussed briefly an all-men's mixer and a tentative date was not decided upon except that it would be held just before the DePauw game, Oct. 2. Meeting adjourned.
