Minutes were read and approved.

A report of the dance played by Henry Bussee was given in which the Union-A.W.S. made a total profit of \$135.08 all of which was given to the I.U. Band Benefit Fund.

Byron reported that he went before the Interfraternity Council and that they reenacted the rule that they had during the previous year of no dances by any fraternity on Friday night. Also that the group passed a rule that not more than \$70 would be paid for campus bands and also the limit on any out of town bands to be \$95 with the exception that any fraternity at their own option would be entitled to have a dance the price of the band being at any figure desired once during the year.

Fletchall reported that William Madigan, editor of the Student, will run some more publicity on the Music Series, and also that the members of the Board still continue to aid in the tikket sales.

Fletchall gave a report of a talk held with Mr.Perry who had previously written the Union concerning the discontinuance of radio broadcasts of football games in the Union Building. Mr. Perry stated that he had not though of both sides when he wrote his letter and that he above all did not want to cause trouble for the Union, but merely wished not to see any injustice done to the students. He withdrew his letter from being published in the Daily Student.
