Report of the Merit Committee in the case of Robert Sturgeon

We, the committee, after having read the written report submitted by Sturgeon, and after having interviewed Sturgeon, recommend that he be given the total number of hours as per his request.

The committee's findings are that Sturgeon has been actingin the Chess Club as a de facto representative of the Union. The Chess Club has duly elected its officers as more or less figureheads. We find that Sturgeon has done all the promotional work for the Club to advance its interests as a Union function. In the opinion of the committee, his sincerity in this matter cannot be questioned.

This decision is based upon the facts of this particular case, and because of the unique situation, we feel that any other decision would be unjust.

We further recommend that, in the future, the committee chairman appointed to supervise any specific work or club sanctioned by the Board should closely supervise all work done for the advancement of the purpose for which the club was organized.
