Roll Call: Cox and Prof. Cogshall absent.
Minutes read and approved.

Baerncopf gave a financial report on the freshman mixer. Expenses were:

He objected to the mimeographing charge since none was done. He said that a roster of summer workers and their hours had been posted. Bridges suggested that workers with more than 100 hours not have their hours posted.

McKown reported that he had located a man to operate the machine at Record Hours.

Wolf said that attendance at Coffee Hours had been excellent and added that no special preparations were being made for the June 10 session.

MacGill reported a substantial loss on the second dance. He also said that because of the lack of student support, the committee had agreed to cancel the remaining summer dances. He suggested an old-fashioned barbecue in Dunn meadow to recoup losses. Blickman suggested that this project be tabled until plans for the prom should be completed.

Mr. Patrick informed the Board that he had written Mr. Biddle, saying that the Union's funds for the proposed reading shelf were insufficient, thus leaving the affair in the hands of the Library committee. He also announced that it would be impossible to create funds to send a delegate of the Board to the International Student Service convention Sept. 2-5, in Washington, D.C. Baerncopf moved to give Robert Gemmer, sophomore, the right to represent the Union Open Forum committee at the convention at Gemmer's own expense. MacGill seconded. Carried.

Mr. Patrick also suggested a letter clarifying the Union's position in regards to the entertainment of Naval yoemen be written to President Wells.

Baerncopf moved for adjournment. McKown seconded. Meeting adjourned at 5:10 p.m.
