

May 23, 1944

Radigan opened.
Minutes read and approved.

Radigan presented the results of Nolan's work on the Union Board hours relative to the Service Award. Concerning this matter, Rich said that the Board should promulgate definite rules for the first award so that personal selection and confusion might be eliminated. Radigan read the requirements of the constitution of the Award to clarify the question. Potential candidates for the honor were discussed. Last semester was decided upon as a basis to work from. 50 hours minimum service for the first Award only was moved by Meyer. Davis 2nd. Carried. Meyer moved that the nine eligible men, having met the requirements above, be submitted to the administration for approval, with qualifications as to Bean and Gemmer. Davis 2nd. Carried. Willis was instructed to write a letter to the vice-president, having it checked by Rich, and to submit a copy at the next meeting. Radigan asked that no publicity be given out concerning the Award.

Davis reported on the activities of the Social Committee. The Committee suggested a dance for Monday, May 29, 1944. Davis discussed the possibilities of the dance as to attendance etc. Rich then discussed the financial aspects of such a dance, pointing out that the Union could not sponsor a dance Monday because of budget limitations. Meyer moved that the Board approve the tentative plans for a record dance on the Terrace on the above date. Davis 2nd. Carried.

Davis announced a Union-A.W.S. dance for Saturday, June 3, 1944. The Dugout is to be open Saturday, May 27, 1944 according to the Social Committee Chairman.

Beko moved for adjournment. Willis seconded. Carried.
