Committee reports:

A dance is planned for Tuesday, February 12. 8 to 11 p.m.--coeds are to have 11:30 hours. Denis Harold's band will play.

A Washington birthday dance is planned for February 22 with Bob Mc Curdy's band.

Town Hall--Weber reporting: There will be a discussion on Sunday, January 13 Topic will be "World Trade".

Chess--Duncan reporting: The Chess Club will elect officers at the next meeting. The members seem enthusiastic.

Special Events--Griggs reporting: There was nothing done about the Christmas parties for the needy children before vacation, due to the lack of needy children.

Recommendations of Previous Boards--Griggs reporting: The investigation of the minutes brought out the following suggestions:
