Jones opened the meeting at 7:00 p.m.

Lambert, and Elsner were absent.

The reading of the minutes of last weeks meeting was dispensed with.

The following committes were appointed:

Chess and Bridge--Elsner
 Town Hall--Plummer
 Special Events--Thompson
 Campus Relations--Wallace
 Billiards--Black
 Personnel--Lambert
 Publicity--Graves
 Record Hours--Grabow
 Pep Sessions--Thomas
 Social--Fague
 Publicity--Campbell

Thompson and Wallace were appointed assistants on pep sessions.

The different jobs were then explained:

Town Hall--a traditional Union function which needs building up.
 Special Events--a new job
 Billiards--one billiard tournament per year.
 Publications--a fresh handbook
 Record Hours--one record hour per week at present.
 Pep Sessions--during football season big sessions are held before the Purdue game. Also any and all kinds of pep sessions. Also in charge of yell leaders.
 Social Chairman--In charge of all Union social events.
 Publicity--All Union events depend on a good publicity program. A report is to be in the student following each meeting.
 Special Events--Taking care of Banquets, etc.
 Personnel--Freshman and others who are available to assist in the operation of their jobs.

Dean Bates suggested combining a handbook on student organizations that he was compiling with the regular Union Freshman handbook. He said when he had it completed he would make it available to us if we wished.

An explanation of activities, etc. was asked for by Campbell. President Jones explained the use of the Personnel workers. He pointed out that the board office should be the board members headquarters. Also communications for all board members can be picked up there.

President Jones said all recording of hours would be by the Personnel Chairman. Board members are to give a list of those working for them and their hours to the Personnel Chairman. However for the remainder of this semester the present system will be continued.

Old Business: There was no old business.

New Business: Black asked for further explanation of immediate activities. Jones said their was to be a picnic in May on Memorial Day. Jones asked for comments on this picnic. Joe Black said he felt the picnic would be a good thing. Jones said the Union Board would not stand the expense unless in the case of an emergency. Thomas said he doubted the advisability of a picnic. Further discussion was held and Jones directed Fague to take it up with the Union-A.W.S. social committee.

Jones also said there would be a dance the night before Memorial Day with late hours. The board approved this dance.

Mr. Smith suggested (through Jones) that we have a free record dance June 8. This was referred to the Social Committee.

Jones appointed a Rules Committee for the Union. On this committee are Black; chairman, Thomas, and Grabow. Jones ex officio member.

Dean Bates said that next year in regards to having Wednesday night dances that he wondered as to its advisability and the advisability of so many students leaving Bloomington on the weekends. He asked for the boards opinion and a discussion was held.

Campbell asked how the auditorium jass concerts paid. Jones said it paid ^{so good} well, but ^{that} it did not pay the band well enough. Discussion was held on this and Thompson was appointed to investigate the possibility of booking bands for concerts.

Thompson moved meeting be adjourned and Campbell seconded it.
