

September 23, 1947

Because Mr. Feltus is no longer a trustee of the University, a vacancy was created on the Board. Dr. Geiger was selected unanimously to serve on Union Board.

A motion was made, seconded and carried unanimously to give this committee authority to make the final selection.

The Annual Homecoming Parade is to be held October 3 beginning at 6 P.M. It is to start on Phi Delt Hill, go down Jordan, Third, Indiana and Seventh to the Auditorium where the Pep Session will be held. There will be a police escort, and it is thought the the D.U. fire truck can be secured. An attempt is being made to secure Senator Jenner for the program.

The voting for Homecoming Queen is scheduled for Friday, October 3, Steckel moved that voting be held from 8:30 to 5:00 on that day. Toy seconded and the motion was carried unanimously. A long discussion followed concerning the place or places where voting could be done. Finally, it was decided that in this particular election, because only one list of eligible voters will be available, that it should be in the Union Bldg. only. Toy moved that no electioneering be maintained in the Union Building. Graves seconded and the motion was carried unanimously. Applications for queen must be made by Noon on Wed. Oct. 1.

From the Board, five escorts, a crown-bearer, a flower-bearer, and an escort for the Governor are to be chosen. Mr. Wheeler explained the mechanics for crowning the queen. Fague suggested that a practice be held Saturday morning and that suits be worn by all. The Union Board is to meet on the stage immediately following the Pep Session.

Toy moved and Graves seconded that no pep session be held before the Nebraska game; the motion was carried 10-2.

Toy suggested that student's seats at athletic contests should be reserved. Dr. Lusk explained Michigan's system. Steckel suggested we write other schools for information on how they manage their cheering sections.

Pres. Wallace assessed fines on Patton, Husband, Quear and Steckel for being late.
